Tribute

October 5, 2016 was indeed a sad and shocking day at the A.G.B.U. Alex and Marie Manoogian School. Long-time teacher and administrator, Dyana Kezelian, went unexpectedly and prematurely to her eternal resting place. High School Principal Dr. Hosep Torossian, High and Middle School Head Teachers Mrs. Judy Kadri and Mrs. Sonia Kalfayan, School Counselor Mrs. Joanna Holsinger, and Faculty gathered the Elementary, Middle, and High School students in separate assemblies and broke the news of Ms. Kezelian's passing. Very Rev. Fr. Aren Jebejian, Pastor of St. John Armenian Church, and Rev. Fr. Hrant Kevorkian, Pastor of St. Sarkis Armenian Apostolic Church, consoled grieving students, teachers, and staff. A special memorial service for current upper school students was held at St. John, where Father Aren offered comforting words and shared vignettes from his frequent hospital visits. He mentioned how much Ms. Kezelian wanted to be present to greet the students on the first day of school on September 6, 2016, but her doctors thought otherwise. Father Aren also remarked how her eyes opened wide and lit up



radiantly when he would tell her about his periodic visits with students at the school. A multitude of students, past and present, alumni, and parents attended the wake, funeral, burial, and the memorial lunch in memory of Ms. Kezelian.

Ms. Kezelian began teaching at the Manoogian School in 1976 and became a fixture as the second grade teacher until her ascent to the position of Principal of Pre-K, Elementary, and Middle School in 2005. Her forty-two year tenure of commitment and dedication to the school

remains unparalleled. She was the pillar of the school and knew its every nook and cranny. Ms. Kezelian embodied the best qualities of an educator. She was full of love, happiness, and joy, knowing how to cajole and motivate students and how to communicate effectively with parents. She left an indelible impression upon her students who cherished her presence and now cherish her memory.

Mrs. Sonia Kalfayan, Ms. Kezelian's long-time colleague, aide, and confidant, has been selected by the Manoogian School Board of Education to serve as Acting Principal. Ms. Kezelian would be pleased with the smooth transition that has transpired. The Manoogian School is on sound footing and has a bright future, thanks in large part to the selfless devotion of Ms. Kezelian, who sacrificed her personal life and comfort for the benefit and well-being of the school. She faithfully carried forth the vision established by the school's illustrious benefactors, Mr. and Mrs. Alex and Marie Manoogian. Ms. Kezelian will be sorely missed, but her memory will remain in the minds, hearts, and souls of all those she touched.

The President and Vice President of the American University of Armenia Visit Michigan

In the month of November, there was great excitement in the Detroit Armenian community involving the A.G.B.U. Detroit Chapter and the A.G.B.U. Alex and Marie Manoogian School.

Participating in the 89th General Assembly of the A.G.B.U. in New York City were the President and Vice President of the American University of Armenia (AUA), Dr. Armen Kureghian and Mr. Ashot Ghazaryan. A.G.B.U. Detroit Chapter and the past Principal of the A.G.B.U. Manoogian School, invited the AUA officials to Michigan.

She did not learn much English until she started school, so she knows (and can still recall) the challenge of learning English and trying to manage her way through school, due to the language barrier. The Sarafians had organized two events on November 1 for the AUA dignitaries. The first was a morning visit and meeting with Manoogian School students, and the other an evening gathering with active members of the Detroit Armenian community. It was evident just how people, young and old, took an abiding interest in the activities and achievements of the AUA.

November first was the first time that a delegation from a university in Armenia had visited the Manoogian School. There was keen interest and curiosity among the High School students; thus, High School Principal Dr. Hosep Torossian decided to invite all students in ninth through twelfth grades to hear the guests speak and watch state-of-the-art videos about the AUA.

Dr. Kureghian and Mr. Ghazaryan gave a comprehensive overview of the history and current status of the American University of Armenia. Dr. Kureghian explained that the rules for acceptance and matriculation at the AUA were the same as for any American university. He mentioned some of the advantages of studying at the AUA, such as the thrill of living in the ancestral homeland and gaining a first-rate education at an affordable price. The students asked numerous questions about the level of education, courses offered, and dormitory life. During the next anticipated class trip to Armenia in 2018, Dr. Torossian promised the students that they would have a chance to visit the AUA and become acquainted first-hand with the daily activities and educational curriculum at the university, and also meet with instructors.

After their meeting with the students, the guests visited several classrooms. They were particularly impressed with the school's modern facilities and scientific laboratories.

In the afternoon, the guests visited Mr. Richard Manoogian at MASCO headquarters, as well as St. John Armenian Church, the Manoogian Museum, and the Mardigian Library.

Dr. Nadya Sarafian stressed the importance of having a high-caliber institution of higher learning in the ancestral homeland. In this regard, she stressed the essential role of the AUA. She also gave thanks to the A.G.B.U. which has sponsored and supported the AUA since its inception. At the conclusion of the gathering, Dr. Torossian invited everyone to a reception where the guests from Armenia talked informally with attendees.

This visit was a worthwhile experience for the community and an unforgettable day for the students at the Manoogian School.

called Regie's Rainbow Adventure. This program was developed to educate children on nutrition and physical activity. By relating


